

Northern Haymeadow Mix

This mix is based on herb-rich pastures of traditionally managed grasslands of upland Britain (British Plant Community MG3). Remnants of ancient meadows of this type survive in Deeside & northern England. There are 17 wildflower & 5 grass species in this mix.
